

I. CATAWBA REGION OVERVIEW

Catawba Regional Council of Governments (CRCOG) is an association of local governments located in North-Central South Carolina. The Catawba Region includes Chester, Lancaster, Union, and York counties. The COG serves as a regional forum for intergovernmental cooperation and a central staffing resource for grantsmanship, land use and transportation planning, community and economic development, workforce investment, GIS mapping, information systems, and project management. South Carolina Councils of Governments were formed by state statute in 1967, with specific geographic regions defined by the state legislature in 1971. There are ten Councils of Governments serving local governments throughout South Carolina.

II. BACKGROUND

In 1998, the South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) contracted with the CRCOG and the nine other COGs in the state to coordinate transportation planning assistance for non-urbanized portions of the State. The SCDOT involved the COGs in decentralizing the transportation planning process, allowing for more local involvement in project identification and development. This partnership between SCDOT and the COGs aids the State in fulfilling the requirements of the federal and state planning process to address the transportation needs of non-metropolitan areas.

III. RURAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROGRAM

As the designated planning agency for the Catawba Region, CRCOG is responsible for maintaining and coordinating transportation plans for the region's rural and non-urbanized areas, managing financial records for planning support funds, and prioritizing and forwarding local project recommendations to SCDOT. The eastern portion of York County and the panhandle of Lancaster County are included in the Rock Hill Urbanized Area as defined by the U.S. Census Bureau and are designated as a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) referred to as the Rock Hill - Fort Mill Area Transportation Study (RFATS). The City of Rock Hill Planning and Development Services Department manages the transportation planning program for RFATS.

The CRCOG implemented a transportation planning process that includes the identification of local priorities at the county level, the development of regional plans by the transportation advisory committee, and plan approval by the CRCOG Board of Directors. Components of the CRCOG transportation planning process include:

- County-level long-range transportation committees for identifying and prioritizing system improvements for inclusion in the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP).
- Prioritized projects are forwarded to the CRCOG Rural Transportation Advisory Committee (TAC) for review, study, and prioritization, with the goal of incorporating them into the regional plan. The plan is then submitted to the CRCOG Board of Directors.
- The CRCOG Board of Directors reviews and approves the Regional TIP and submits

to the SCDOT Commission as recommendations for inclusion into the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP).

The CRCOG has a 32-member Board of Directors that sets policy for the COG. Approximately half of the membership is comprised of local elected officials from all four counties, including state legislators, county council members, and mayors or city council members. Each county council ratifies appointments made by municipalities represented within each county and appoints the remaining citizen and minority representatives of the Board. The representation of each county and municipality on the Board of Directors is determined by an agreed-upon formula.

To assist the COG Board with transportation planning-related evaluation and recommendations, the Catawba Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee was formed. The TAC is comprised of voting and non-voting members with representatives from local government transportation providers, as well as special interest groups. Current voting members include one representative from each county and one municipal representative from each county. The CRCOG, SCDOT Headquarters, and SCDOT District 4 staff, as well as public works directors and transportation planners across the region, provide staff and advisory support. This committee plays an important role in identifying, analyzing, and prioritizing transportation needs and goals for the region. Due to the involvement of the TAC and COG Executive Board, local governments are directly consulted and allowed to identify transportation needs that may be included in the STIP.

IV. RURAL PLANNING WORK PROGRAM

The Rural Planning Work Program (RPWP) for the Catawba Region is developed biennially and documents major transportation planning and related activities within the rural areas of the Catawba Region for the next two fiscal years (July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2027). The RPWP aims to identify work program tasks and present budget allocations for planning activities to be undertaken within the CRCOG Study Area. The document also serves as the basis for funding assistance from the Federal Highway Administration/Federal Transit Administration (FHWA/FTA), the state (SCDOT), and local agencies for transportation planning activities.

The CRCOG works closely with various interest groups and local government officials in all four counties of the Catawba Region and within the Charlotte Metropolitan Region to coordinate transportation planning. By providing regional coordination among planning partners and setting Regional recommendations can help cities and counties better coordinate their planning efforts to develop an integrated, multimodal transportation system for the Catawba Region and the State of South Carolina.

V. GENERAL FUNCTIONS

This section relates to general activities to be undertaken throughout the planning process. In the implementation of all items of the work plan, CRCOG will strive to meet the 10 Federal planning factors established by the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (FAST Act). The Federal Transportation Authorization legislation was signed into law on December 4, 2015, and was subsequently revised under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Future updates to the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) must comply with FAST Act (or the transportation authorization

legislation in effect at that time). The FAST Act guides the transportation planning and programming processes throughout the country through these 10 planning factors:

FAST ACT/BIL PLANNING FACTORS

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the area, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency.
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 4. Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and freight.
- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and state and local planned growth and economic development patterns.
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system across and between modes for people and freight.
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation.
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.
- 9. Improve the resilience and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts on surface transportation.
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

VI. WORK PROGRAM ELEMENTS

In addition to the work program elements outlined in this RPWP, work shall include other specific activities as requested by SCDOT. The scope of work may also include activities or studies addressing other transportation planning-related issues that may be of specific interest to the region. However, the cost of implementing the entire program must be kept within the financial assistance provided unless additional funds are made available to finance the work.

A. PROGRAM ADMINISTRATION

1. Rural Transportation Program Management

Description:

This activity includes all ongoing department-wide management and administrative activities necessary to initiate and effectively manage the transportation planning process. This does not include activities attributable to specific program activities. There are three objectives for this work task:

- a. Administration of transportation planning work program activities;
- b. Completion of necessary contracts, invoices, progress reports, correspondence, grant applications in support of the work program, and meeting coordination and attendance; and
- c. Professional development activities, including attendance at regional, state, and national meetings and conferences that provide educational opportunities to identify best practices in transportation planning for program staff.

Methodology + Work Product:

- Preparation of meeting agendas, notices, minutes, memorandums, and other correspondence, including staff assistance for the Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee and CRCOG Board of Directors.
- Preparation of quarterly and annual financial progress reports, invoices, and correspondence.
- Complete grant applications and proposals as applicable.
- Coordination and support relating to the Statewide Multimodal Transportation Plan.
- Participate with the SCDOT on regional transportation studies, reports, and programs.
- Participate in and hold monthly and quarterly meetings with state and regional transportation professionals.

2. FAST Act and Transportation Performance Management

Description:

This activity includes work related to compliance with FAST Act policies and guidance, including adopting statewide targets for Transportation Performance Management (TPM) that include annual safety targets (PM-1) and biannual adoption of the SCDOT Strategic Asset Management Plan System Performance Report, including the PM 2 Infrastructure and PM 3 System Performance measures and targets and other SCDOT Initiatives.

<u>Methodology + Work Product:</u>

- Implementation of FAST Act planning requirements.
- Coordination efforts to develop performance management strategies.

B. TRANSPORTATION PLANNING TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE

1. Transportation Modeling

Description:

This task will include working with the South Carolina Department of Transportation to further develop the existing travel demand model for the Catawba Region. By having this capability, CRCOG staff can collaborate with local jurisdictions and SCDOT to identify problem areas and analyze alternative highway improvements in the region.

Methodology + Work Product:

An ongoing effort to incorporate data into transportation planning products such as the Metrolina Regional Travel Demand Model (MRTDM).

- Continue to collect and analyze building permit data and development approvals for all new construction in the region.
- Continue analysis of employment patterns in the study area.
- Continued collection and analysis of census data and other socioeconomic data to update the travel demand model.
- Participation in MRTDM team meetings and activities as appropriate for the Catawba Region.
- Coordinate with Charlotte Area Regional Partners to integrate CommunityViz software as the primary source of data for regional modeling efforts.

2. Long Range Transportation Plan & TIP

Description:

This task will involve collaborating with the South Carolina Department of Transportation, the Regional Transportation Technical Advisory Committee, and other local and regional government representatives to implement the Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP 2025-2050) for the Catawba Region. The LRTP is the guiding policy plan from which the TIP and RPWP are developed. The plan advances the overall movement of people and goods within the region, identifying existing conditions, trends, and transportation needs

and opportunities for the next 25 years. The LRTP considers the interrelated nature of transportation and land use decisions, as well as their potential impacts on the region, community, economy, and environment. The LRTP is to be updated every five years to reflect the latest changes in transportation, population, and land use trends that may impact the region's future. The development of the Transportation Improvement Program is vital to ensuring the timely implementation of the LRTP.

Methodology + Work Product:

In an ongoing effort to integrate data into long-range transportation planning activities, CRCOG staff will work collaboratively with regional partners to update the Travel Demand Models for South Carolina and the Metrolina region. TIP maintenance is also an ongoing task and will be reviewed and approved by the TAC in compliance with SCDOT Commission policies.

- Update the priority project list, including road widening, new road alignments, intersection improvements, safety improvements, sidewalks, and bikeways as needed.
- Identification of possible local needs studies and plans.
- Meetings with local government representatives, including administrators, elected officials, planners, and economic developers.
- Enhanced public participation through the dissemination of information and receipt of public comments.
- Participation in SCDOT activities related to the Statewide Multimodal Transportation Plan, specifically for the Catawba Region.
- Use and training of Streetlight in the project selection process
- Utilization and Training of the AASHTOWare Safety Program in the Project Selection Process.
- Update and maintenance of the 2025-2050 Long Range Transportation Plan
- Update and maintenance of the 2024-2033 Transportation Improvement Program
- Manage the development and completion of the City of Union Sidewalk Master Plan.
- Integrate the Regional Mobility Plan Priority Corridor Project Recommendations into the LRTP and TIP.

3. Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Management

Description:

Soliciting, assisting local communities, evaluating, and developing letters of intent and formal applications for the Transportation Alternatives Program as appropriate.

<u>Methodology + Work Product:</u>

The CRCOG will continue to provide advisory assistance to eligible applicants, including project scope definition and preparation of bi-yearly TAP application cycles as needed.

• The CRCOG will continue to monitor the development and implementation of previously funded TAP projects.

- Will seek out potential TAP funding-eligible projects during the biyearly funding cycles and provide direct and indirect support and assistance to rural partner agencies as they pursue TAP grant funding.
- Will serve as Local Public Agency and coordinate the construction of the SC 215/Times Blvd Sidewalk Project.

4. Technical Assistance and Intergovernmental Coordination

Description:

Foster intergovernmental and interagency coordination to ensure a coordinated and comprehensive approach to transportation planning and programming. Serve as a liaison between the CRCOG and member governments, the RFATS MPO, and federal, state, and local agencies. Serves as a liaison between the CRCOG and regional transportation planning efforts, including the Charlotte Regional Alliance for Transportation (CRAFT), the Metrolina Regional Travel Demand Model, and regional air quality initiatives.

<u>Methodology + Work Product:</u>

- The CRCOG will continue to attend RFATS MPO, MRTDM, and CRAFT meetings to ensure representation of South Carolina interests in regional efforts as appropriate.
- The CRCOG will continue to participate in regional transportation and air quality-related initiatives as deemed appropriate and beneficial to the Catawba Region.
- The CRCOG will continue ongoing regional initiatives with the Centralina Council of Governments in the Charlotte Metro Region. These regional initiatives include ongoing implementation activities related to CONNECT and other initiatives deemed appropriate and beneficial to the Catawba Region.
- Participate in the Bi-state Regional Intelligent Transportation System/Transportation Incident Management ITS/TIM Strategic Action Plan.
- Coordinate with the Carolina Thread Trail (CTT) and Regional Partners on ongoing trail initiatives.
- Provide GIS Support as needed.

5. Transit Planning

Description:

Serve as a facilitator of regional collaboration, cooperation, and coordination as needed.

Professional development activities, including attendance at regional, state, and national meetings and conferences that provide educational opportunities to identify transit planning best practices for program staff.

<u>Methodology + Work Product:</u>

SCDOT shall maintain the administrative and oversight functions for all applicable Federal

Transit Administration (FTA) programs administered by SCDOT, including programs such as 5310 and 5311. The following are focus areas related to transit initiatives that are established to enhance regional public and specialized transit efficiency and effectiveness:

- Assist SCDOT in improving communication and cooperation among regional transportation providers;
- Partner with RFATS and the other CRAFT agencies to coordinate efforts for the Connect Beyond Project.
- Assist public and human service agencies in assessing gaps and barriers in transportation delivery for public and disadvantaged groups in the region;
- Assist in regional transportation planning efforts, including the assessment of mobility needs, economic development related to multimodal planning, and identification of other partnership and funding resources;
- Assist in regional advocacy of public and human service transportation services;
- Facilitate and foster the opportunity for stakeholder meetings related to the coordination of transit services (e.g., Study Teams, Coordination Council, and public meetings);
- Facilitate coordination of local human service transportation funding requests:
 - Assisting SCDOT in the dissemination of announcements and application packages within the region of responsibility;
 - Accepting completed applications;
 - Prioritizing projects;
 - COGS: submitting to SCDOT Office of Public Transit a prioritized list of recommended projects for final review and funding recommendations:
 - SCDOT will enter into contractual agreements directly with the subrecipients as approved by the Commission.
 - The SCDOT Office of Public Transit is responsible for reviewing the regional priority list and making a final recommendation on the award.
 - Each year, SCDOT will determine the appropriate funding level for COGs for administrative purposes.
- Providing any update to the Regional Transit & Coordination Plan.
- Coordinate with regional partners on the CONNECT Beyond Charlotte Regional Transit Plan.

6. Complete Streets Planning Activities

Description:

States, MPOs, and COGs are required to use at least 2.5% of SPR and PL funds, respectively, on Complete Streets planning activities. This equates to approximately \$3,900 annually.

Methodology + Work Product

The CRCOG intends to utilize 2.5% of the SPR funding towards TAP projects. This will include project identification, scoping, placement of the project within the LRTP, and coordination with SCDOT and local jurisdictions during project delivery.

C. PUBLIC PARTICIPATION

VII. IMPLEMENTATION OF PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN

Description:

This task will involve collaborating with the South Carolina Department of Transportation to integrate public involvement into all plans, meetings, public notices, and processes.

<u>Methodology + Work Product:</u>

As federal requirements stipulate opportunities for public input, the CRCOG and SCDOT have partnered in the past to host public hearings in affected communities. CRCOG will purposefully integrate community engagement into planning activities, including TIP and LRTP amendments, for future transportation projects in the Catawba Region.

IX. CRCOG RURAL TRANSPORTATION BUDGET

In FY 2024-2025, the SCDOT will contract with the CRCOG for transportation planning services. The contract amount is \$125,000. These funds require a 20% local match, which produces a total project budget of \$156,250. The budget for the FY 2025-2026 work program, by planning element, is below.
